NORTHERN IRELAND'S MCAULEY SPORTING HEROES!

Laurence McAuley, County Antrim, Northern Ireland

To have one sporting McAuley hero come from my small hometown of Larne, situated on the County Antrim coast of Northern Ireland, is quite a feat, but to have two really is quite incredible. Dave 'Boy' McAuley and Gareth McAuley (unrelated), although now retired, are internationally well-known icons in their past professional sports of boxing and football. Today both men are in high demand as TV pundits, giving their expertise on title fights and Northern Ireland international football matches. Both men have been honoured by the Queen with MBEs for their outstanding service to their respective sport.

Dave 'Boy' McAuley

Born in 1961 in Larne, Dave boxed as an orthodox flyweight. At 5'7", Dave was notably tall for someone in the flyweight division. Competing professionally from 1983 to 1992, he made a British record of five world title defences, holding the IBF flyweight title from 1989 to 1992. He challenged twice for the world WBA flyweight title in 1987 and 1988. At regional level, he held the British flyweight title in 1986. His boxing record reads 23 fights with 18 wins, 3 losses, and 2 draws.

On April 25, 1987, the 25-year-old flyweight fought what he describes as both the most memorable and brutal fight of his career. It was to become arguably the greatest fight ever seen on Irish soil.

'It was my first world title contest against the WBA champion Fidel Bassa, and it was fought over 15 rounds. I was beaten, and it took me six months to recover'. He may have lost, but everyone in the capacity crowd at the King's Hall Belfast rose to applaud McAuley's bravery.

The Columbian was on the canvas twice, and if McAuley could have floored him again, the title would have transferred ownership. However, in the thirteenth round with the Irishman leading on points, the champion managed to get in a vital knockdown punch to keep his crown.

The irony is that my fight against Bassa was the last to go 15 rounds. The WBA changed contests to 12 rounds after this. But at least it did make history. It was voted seventy-fifth best fight of all time, fight of the year in Britain, and third best fight of the 1980s'.

In 1989, McAuley came out of retirement when offered a world title bout as underdog against champion Duke McKenzie at Wembley arena, London. He gave a masterclass on boxing to take the world title on a unanimous points decision. Defending his IBF world crown a further five times, he eventually ended his career as one of the most successful British and Irish fighters in history.

Today, along with his broadcast work, Dave helps run the popular Halfway House Hotel on the scenic Antrim Coast Road. Incidentally, he and family members attended the Clan MacAulay Gathering held in Carnlough, Co. Antrim, in 2011.

Gareth McAuley

My far-off cousin, Gareth McAuley (Gareth's g/g grandfather and my g/g grandfather were brothers), is without doubt a legend of Northern Ireland football. Amassing 80 international caps for his country (scoring nine goals), the 6'4" stalwart defender, known as 'Big G', will forever be remembered for his stunning headed opening goal for N. Ireland against Ukraine in the Euro finals of 2016 in France. The headlining 2-0 victory in Lyon was to qualify N. Ireland for the last 16, a notable feat for such a small country in their first-ever Euro finals. As a result, the team earned the title 'The Kings of Lyon'.

Gareth was born in Larne in 1979 and began his football career playing for his school team, Moyle Primary School (incidentally the school of my youth). His career steadily improved, and in 2000, he came of note after winning 'Player of the Year' at Irish League club Crusaders. A transfer to Coleraine, another Irish League team, saw him lift the Irish Cup in the 2002/03 final and again be voted club 'Player of the Year'. English professional football soon beckoned, and Lincoln City signed him up for a fee of £10,000 in 2004. Although Gareth had come to English professional football at a late age, he was so highly rated that transfers to Leicester City and Ipswich Town soon followed, with his transfer fee now commanding £1 million in 2008.

In 2011, Gareth signed for English Premier League side West Bromwich Albion, where he made 203 appearances (scoring fifteen goals). After an impressive 2013 season, he was voted 'Players Player of the Year' and 'Supporters Player of the Year'. (That included scoring the only goal of the game in the 1-0 home victory against the superstars of Chelsea.)

Gareth signed for his boyhood favourite club, Scottish premiership side Glasgow Rangers, in 2018, where he made seven appearances before his retirement from the game at age 39 years. A fabulous playing career had come to an end.

Recently, Gareth completed the necessary coaching badges and gained the required license to coach at a professional level. He is currently involved in coaching the Northern Ireland youth teams and scouts for various English clubs for young talent. He also writes a weekly sports column for a Northern Irish tabloid.

THE AUSTRALIAN MACAULAY SURFING FAMILY

The Margaret River region of Western Australia is renowned for its wines, especially the soft Cabernet Sauvignons that are favoured by the breezes from the Southern Ocean. These same breezes have also developed the surfing prowess of the family of Dave and Lorraine Macaulay.

It is not often you find an entire family not only out surfing, but with members who are world class in what they do. Dave's four children, Ellie and Laura (who are twins), Jack (who regrettably passed away in 2021), and Bronte followed in his footsteps.

Dave was born in 1963 in Perth, Western Australia, and began his surfing career with a goofy stance when only eleven years old, winning the Western Australian State Championships in 1982 and 1983, and finishing as runner-up in the National Titles in 1983 and 1985. He rose through the ranks after turning professional, and in 1989 he won three ASP World Championship Tour Events in a row in Brazil, Japan, and Australia. He reached third ranking in the world on the Men's Championship Tour in 1989 and 1993, and he has surfed pretty well all major surfing classics, on boards he makes himself.

When you are good at something you do, it makes sense to make your own equipment, and Dave enjoys shaping boards at Dmac Surfboards. Shaping his own boards and those of his children for the last three decades is an outlet for his love of surfing.

Whilst no longer surfing in all the main events, Dave's experience meant he was still able to win the Azores World Masters Championship in 2018, even though he was the oldest competitor. 'I never dreamed this would happen,' Dave said afterwards. 'I've had a very fortunate life, being able to keep surfing after the tour. All my kids surf, and it's just insane.' The Macaulay family's professional surfing life continues as Dave has passed the baton to his daughters Bronte and Laura. Whilst not a professional surfer, Ellie still rides because of the enjoyment she gets from surfing.

Bronte, also with goofy stance, continues to excel with Dave as her manager and mentor (although she now rides DHD boards). When I first asked Dave about this article, he was in transit to surfing events in Hawaii and Portugal with Bronte. The first World Surfing League competition this year that Bronte competed in was the just-completed Hurley Pro Sunset Beach Classic in Oahu, Hawaii.

Bronte's professional rookie year of 2017 started well as she amazed the pundits by winning a three-woman heat that included the world champion Steph Gilmore at the Surfest in Newcastle, NSW. In 2021, she finished eleventh in the Women's CT ranking, after deciding in August not to complete the 2021 season.

As mentioned, Bronte's recent action was the Hurley Pro Sunset Beach (Hawaii, USA) from 11 February 2022, and she replaced the world #6, Caroline Marks, who withdrew due to medical reasons.

But this is not to forget Laura, who in 2020 joined a select group of surfers (and the first female surfer) to have conquered The Right, a wave so big on the Western Australian south coast that it had the reputation of being unsurfable.

'It is pretty nerve-wracking because of the consequences,' Laura said. 'It feels different; it's not like going for a normal surf.'

The conquering of The Right shows that the MacAulay motto 'Dulce Periculum' ('Danger Is Sweet') is still valid today.

The Macaulay surfing family of Western Australia is another example of our war cry—MacAulay Forever!

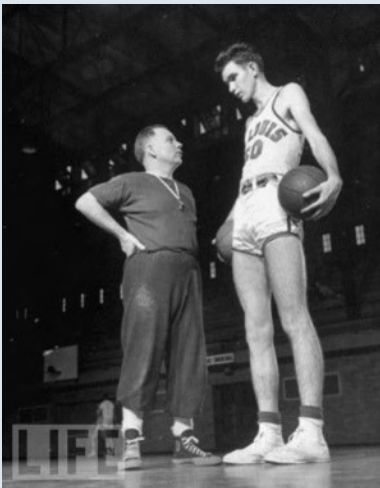
CHARLES EDWARD ('EASY ED') MACAULEY – COLLEGE AND NBA PROFESSIONAL BASKETBALL PLAYER

Mike Macauley/Bob Macauley, Commissioners, Missouri

'Easy Ed', as he was known since his college playing days at St. Louis University in St. Louis, Missouri, was a highly decorated university and NBA professional basketball player. Macauley is also the father of two current clan commissioners: Bob Macauley, Commissioner of Southern Missouri, and Mike Macauley, Commissioner of Northern Missouri.

Easy Ed's rise to notoriety began in college. As a highly recruited high school prep player out of St. Louis University High School, including by the likes of Adolph Rupp at the University of Kentucky, Ed could have chosen almost any college. But his mother famously told him that he could attend any university he wanted to as long as 'it was Catholic and located in St. Louis!' That sealed the deal, and Ed was destined for the Jesuit-run St. Louis University, where he would become the most notable Billiken to ever ply the hardwood for the school.

In 1948, Ed's junior year, the Billikens stormed New York City, winning the National Invitational Tournament (NIT—then the biggest and most important tournament in the country) by beating New York University (NYU) 65-52 in the finals. For his exploits, Ed earned the tournament MVP designation, and he finished college as a two-time consensus first team All-American (1948, 1949). *(Photo left: Ed is pictured with his St. Louis University coach, Eddie Hickey.)*



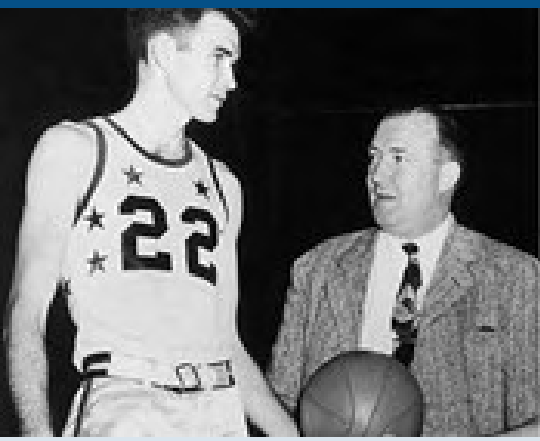
Ed was drafted in 1949 by the St. Louis Bombers, an NBA franchise located in his hometown. When the Bombers folded the following year, Ed was picked up by the Boston Celtics. Playing with the likes of Bob Cousy and Bill Sharman, Ed went on to distinguish himself as one of the best centres in the game. The Celtics honoured Ed by retiring his No. 22 jersey.

At the end of the 1956 season, in one of the most important trades in NBA history, Ed was traded to the St. Louis Hawks along with Cliff Hagan, an outstanding player from Kentucky, for the rights to sign Bill Russell, who was graduating from the University of San Francisco. The trade was especially important for Ed, who needed to be back in St. Louis to help his wife Jackie raise their growing family of three, which included Patrick, a child severely disabled at the age of one due to a bout of meningitis.

The trade was good for St. Louis! The following season, the Hawks defeated the Boston Celtics to win the NBA crown—to this day the only NBA championship for the city of St. Louis.

Upon retiring, Ed's playing statistics instantly qualified him for nomination to the National Basketball Hall of Fame. Upon his induction at the age of thirty-two, he became, and still remains, the youngest person ever inducted into the HOF. Some of Ed's other notable accomplishments during his storied career include:

- 7-time NBA All-Star Game nominee (1951-1957)
- MVP of the first ever NBA All-Star Game (1951)
- 3-time All-NBA First Team (1951-1953)
- 11,234 total points (17.5 ppg)
- 4,324 rebounds (7.5 rpg)
- 2,079 assists (3.2 apg)

Ed is regularly recognized as one of the Top 100 NBA basketball players of all time. He is also a distinguished member of the Missouri Sports HOF, the St. Louis Sports HOF, and the St. Louis University Sports HOF.

Ed retired from basketball after the 1960 season and started a career in broadcasting and public speaking, then later in life, writing and investing. Ed inspired tens of thousands of young people by sharing important life lessons with them at his basketball camps, school commencement speeches, etc. Bill Bradley, himself an outstanding NBA player from the St. Louis area and an attendee at one of Ed's camps, regularly quoted Ed during his many public speeches. That quote is shown below.

Despite all his accomplishments, Ed was, through it all, a very humble man. When asked what events were the most important in his life, he consistently identified them as 1) his marriage to his wife Jackie, 2) the births of their seven children, and 3) the subsequent births of their seventeen grandchildren. He was a man of faith (he was an ordained deacon in the Catholic Church), a dedicated husband (58 years married to Jackie), and a family man. Ed Macauley was born on March 22, 1928. He passed, surrounded by his family, on November 8, 2011, at the age of 83.

REFLECTIONS

Colin McAulay, Reverend

Roy was born with a debilitating disease which would confine him to a wheelchair for the duration of his life. His mother became his full-time carer. By the time Roy reached his mid-twenties, his mother was exhausted and desperate for some respite. Around that time, a youth and community worker heard about Roy and, following a visit to his home, offered to organise a visit by Roy to his local youth and community centre.

The outcome of this was the offer of part-time paid employment to Roy. Because of his disability and being confined to his wheelchair, Roy's input was limited to handing out table-tennis bats and balls and to chatting to the young people who attended the youth club. So, three evenings a week, he worked at the club, and at the same time, his mother got a well-deserved rest.

Roy adapted easily to his task at the youth club. The young people loved chatting with Roy and treated him respectfully. Thanks to the local education authority, Roy received a small payment which would not jeopardise his disability allowance. So, for the first time in his life, Roy was earning some income through his own efforts. This was a huge boost to his self-confidence!! In fact, he eventually saved enough to pay his airfare to Canada to visit his brother.

Sadly, Roy died several years ago. However, at least he had the satisfaction of proving to himself, and to others, that he was able to make a contribution to society, albeit a limited one.

We shall never know the extent of Roy's influence on the young people he worked with, nor, indeed, the impact this opportunity made on his life.
