QUIDDITCH ANYONE?

Editor's Note: Though we received the information for this article too late for our sport-focused Spring Issue, we thought you would enjoy it, even late.

You may not be aware of it, but there's a Macaulay Honors College in New York City. Originally named the CUNY Honors College—one of eight campuses of the City University of New York—the school changed its name after a generous donation from financier and energy business investor William E. Macaulay. Macaulay at CUNY, as it's known, is an honors college that provides students with the resources and support to succeed during their undergraduate years.

Besides having some great Macaulay clothing and other college gear, the school has a quidditch team, known as the Macaulay Marauders. Those of us who've read or watched the Harry Potter series know what quidditch is, though the sport is difficult to explain. This "full-contact, multigender sport" was created by students at Middlebury College in Vermont in 2005. It doesn't involve flying, but it is complicated, with four different balls in play on the field at the same time and a player dressed in yellow acting as the "snitch."

The Macaulay Marauders team was formed in 2012 during an expansion in the sport. They earned bids to nationals in 2013, 2014, 2016, 2017, 2018, and 2019, until the competition was suspended due to COVID-19. The Marauders also won the Big Apple Quidditch Conference season closer in 2013. In years that allow for full competition, they hold relationships with and have traveled to other school teams, including friends NYU Quidditch, Rutgers Quidditch, and Hofstra Quidditch.

Though the rules have changed a lot throughout the years, the picture shows the primary components of the game. More information is available on usquidditch.org.

A PRIMER ON QUIDDITCH

According to US Quidditch rules, seven players per team are on the field at a time. Each position wears a different colored headband. Four balls are in play at one time.

THE TEAM



1 SEEKER

chases and catches the snitch to score points and end the game; must grab the tail off of the Snitch's shorts. The snitch is worth 30 points.



3 CHASERS

score goals with the quaffle by throwing or kicking it into the hoops (each goal is worth 10 points).



2 BEATERS

use the bludgers to disrupt other players




1 KEEPER

guards the hoops from opposing chasers

THE BALLS

1 SNITCH



1 QUAFFLE

A volleyball is used to score goals by throwing or kicking it into the hoops. The keepers and chasers are the only ones allowed to use this ball. Chasers can use a quaffle to block incoming bludgers.

3 BLUDGERS

These balls are used by the beaters to set back other players. When a player is hit with a bludger, they must drop any ball they are holding, return to their side and touch one of their goalposts before re-entering play.













THE AUSTRALIAN CELTIC FESTIVAL

In the dim first light of dawn, the Highland mist swirled around the brooding standing stones where figures holding banners aloft, as if to appease the darkness, could be seen moving from stone to stone in some sort of ritual. At the first sight of the rising sun, a lone piper broke the silence. As the sunlight probed the mist, the banners became identifiable as those belonging to the Clans MacAulay, McDonald, Buchanan, Cameron, Kerr, Sutherland, Henderson, and Edmonstone, and their holders were greeting each other at their return for the dawn opening ceremony of the 2022 Australian Celtic Festival (ACF) at Glen Innes in northern New South Wales.

Held on the weekend of 30 April–1 May this year, it was back to pre-COVID-19 conditions with street parades, more pipe bands, and many more people attending. The population of Glen Innes swells every year on the ACF weekend, and this year it was apparent that the crowds were returning in force.

All clan tents were positioned around the outside of the standing stone circle. The MacAulay tent was prominent as usual, although more tentless clans were represented at the festival. The team of Robert and Kate Macauley and myself and partner Lyn were kept busy, especially on Saturday. There was considerably interest in the clan, and we gave out a number of membership application forms as we were approached by MacAulays and, just as importantly, people who knew MacAulays. However, we were still able to help other people who wanted to trace their ancestry but did not know how to start, including one lady whose name I identified as a sept of Clan Cameron, so we directed them to our friends in the next tent.

The fun was all around us: Irish and Scottish dancing in the marquee behind the tent, heavy games further over, jousting on the flat at the top of the hill, traditional and modern Celtic singing in the marquee across the circle from us, with the people in the medieval village also just behind (and that was something to behold, as they camped there all weekend in medieval fashion but with iPhones and Wi-Fi), and continual pipe and drum bands in the stone circle itself.

And, if that was not enough, Glen Innes comes alive at ACF time with many events held in town itself from Thursday to Sunday. These included more dancing and singing at the clubs and pubs and a special presentation at the Chapel Theatre (which holds a maximum of just over 200 people, so you can get an idea of the acoustics) by the Cantorian Sydney Male Voice Choir singing mainly in Welsh and English, although several other languages were used at times. Never has Men of Harlech sounded better!

The heavy games was not a competition between clans but a demonstration by a dedicated group of sportspeople who ONLY do the heavy games because of its camaraderie compared to strong man and woman competitions. It was still a very impressive display, and I refer the reader to my posts on the Facebook pages of both Clan MacAulay and MacAulay Clan in Australia. A feature was Fran, who is the Australian female heavy champion — not bad, as she has six grandchildren and runs a Charolais cattle property!!

Sunday was a quieter affair with fewer visitors, so it gave us an opportunity to sit with our Cameron neighbours and talk about increasing membership for all clans. They are having the same issues as us — trying to gain the interest of younger people. It seems we may need to hold multi-clan events to get to a threshold in numbers.

Sunday was also the day of the presentation of the clans to the attendees and each clan representative was asked to speak on clan events for the next year. Of course, Stornoway 2022 was the topic I chose.

Guest nation status at the Australian Celtic Festival rotates around all Celtic countries. This year it was Brittany, Isle of Man, Cornwall, and Wales. Next year, 4–7 May 2023, is a special event, as it will be the year that Scotland will be the sole guest nation.

Glen Innes in May doesn't sound any better!!

A relatively small (around 1,000) but highly enthusiastic group of festival guests made the 15-minute drive west of Springfield to experience a day of fun activities, great music, and spirited athletic games. A dozen clan tents made up "clan row" and were a popular stopping place for many of the visitors. Clan MacAulay enjoyed regular traffic at its tent.

Though temperatures were steamy (upper 80s Fahrenheit), Bob, Mike, and their respective wives Geri and Janet endured and represented the clan in fine fashion. Everyone agreed it was great to be back in "games mode" spreading the good word about Clan MacAulay and promoting Scottish culture in general. Colin McAulay, Reverend

The fifth anniversary of the Manchester Arena bombing, in which 23 people died (including the suicide bomber) and 1,017 were seriously injured, was commemorated recently. Martin Hibbart was among those who were seriously injured. He was paralysed and became wheelchair bound.

However, five years after Martin was paralysed, he was determined to make the most of his circumstances. He set himself the challenge of climbing Mount Kilimanjaro in a specially modified wheelchair assisted by a team of expert climbers. Martin hopes to fundraise one million pounds to be donated to organisations working with people who are paralysed and need specialist help at home. I understand that, to date, he has raised an amazing 530,000 pounds. I have little doubt he will reach his target of one million pounds.

Martin, although seriously injured, is keen to help other paralysed people who are completely housebound and require 24-hour care. Fortunately, Martin is not completely paralysed, and he is therefore determined to help those less fortunate than himself.

It is amazing what the human spirit is capable of achieving even against all odds. Martin is surely a classic example of such an irrepressible spirit, capable of climbing "mountains."

As we reflect on our own circumstances, perhaps we, like Martin, are capable of climbing the "mountains" in our lives, and in the process, helping other people.

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My Search for Tigh Dearg



In 2003, when attending my fourth Macaulay Clan Gathering at Rosslea Country House Hotel Rhu, I drove early one morning along the coast from Helensburgh to Kilcreggan and stopped and asked someone, 'Where is Tigh Dearg?'. He immediately said along the road up the hill and turn left, and there it was, sloping down the hillside with view of the Clyde below—a beautiful, old, established home with slate roof, four chimneys, pink painted stucco, shiny black shutters, extended sun room with Scotch Thistle iron capping running along the ridge of the roof. All this set in a beautiful garden.

Dare I knock on the door so early in the morning? I descended the path past the shiny black doors of the garden room to the back door and knocked. I explained who I was and that this was the home built by my relative Miss Margaret Macaulay in 1895/6. She was the daughter of William Macaulay, our great-grandfather James's brother. She was a music teacher in Greenoch, never married, and bought the land from Sir John Douglas Sutherland Campbell, the Marquis of Lorne. The sasine included very specific instructions of how the house was to be built, the type of fences, and access for a jetty to be erected for boats to moor. The owners were most welcoming, and I had a tour through the house.

I later ordered the complete 10-page feu contract of sale from the National Archives of Scotland. If only Margaret knew the pleasure I had in discovering her home, The Red Croft.

At times it seemed like the Gathering was in the far distant future, but that future is now close upon us.



A SHORT SUMMARY OF DNA TESTING

Receiving your DNA test results is not the end of your search... it's the beginning. The results can't give you the names of your ancestors or any of their vital details. What they can do is provide you with a list of "matches"—people who took the same test you did, at the same company, and who share with you the type of DNA specifically targeted by that test. Where to look for a connection with your match depends on the type of DNA tested.

What do you want to learn from DNA testing? The answer to that question will help you decide which DNA test to take. Each test examines a different kind of DNA and gives you different match lists. Not all testing companies sell every type of test, and each has a private database that is not shared with the other companies.

Autosomal DNA (atDNA): Males and females have atDNA. Matches can be related on any family line as far back as 4–6 generations. Autosomal DNA tests are available from AncestryDNA, Family Tree DNA, MyHeritage, and 23andMe.

YDNA: Only males have yDNA. It is passed from father to son. A yDNA match indicates two males have a common paternal ancestor. While there are other yDNA testing companies, Family Tree DNA offers different levels of yDNA tests and has the largest database.

Mitochondrial DNA (mtDNA): Both males and females have mtDNA. It is passed from mothers to their children. An mtDNA match between two people indicates they have a common maternal ancestor. Because mtDNA rarely mutates, it is less useful for genealogy research.

The Clan MacAulay Association isn't a testing company, doesn't sell tests, and doesn't store test results. But we have volunteers who can help guide your testing and help with the interpretation of your results. Feel free to get in touch.
