John McAulay VC

In thinking about this issue and our theme of remembrance, I wanted to highlight John McAulay, a Scotsman who earned the Victoria Cross, one of the highest awards a British soldier can receive. It requires an act of extreme bravery in the presence of the enemy,

John McAulay was the only Scottish policeman to gain a Victoria Cross.

McAulay, the son of a miner, had joined up within a month of the start of the war. By the end of 1915, his bravery had seen him promoted three times in one day. He had been mentioned in dispatches, officially listed for his bravery, in December 1916 and, in September 1917, he was awarded the Distinguished Conduct Medal for his actions in the battle of Ypres in 1916. He had taken command of his platoon after his officer had been killed, cleared two strongly-held dugouts and "accounted for several snipers".

On 27 November, 1917, McAulay's platoon was pinned down during the Battle of Cambrai on a sunken road by German machine gunfire. When his commander, Lieutenant A Kinnaird, was wounded, McAulay lifted him ... cont'd

on to his back and carried him to safety amid shells bursting around him. Still carrying the officer, he rallied the men, placed Kinnaird in a shelter and seized a machine gun. He set it up in the road and, as the Germans came over the ridge, completely stopped their attack. He then carried Kinnaird another 500 yards through "a tornado of bullets, killing two Germans who tried to intercept him". Though escaping without a scratch, he is said to have "accounted for 50 of the enemy by himself".

An Aberdeen journalist in the trenches recorded how McAulay learned of his award of the VC in January 1918: "A modest man... he was deafened by the cheers... fellow sergeants almost shook his arm off...the VC was mounted shoulder-high and headed by the piper, marched round and round."

McAulay returned home in February 1918 and was decorated by King George V on 16 March.

He rejoined the Glasgow police in January 1919 and was promoted to sergeant in June that year. He had also married in April, but tragically lost his wife Isabella in childbirth a year later.

The Glasgow Police War Memorial in the city's cathedral was dedicated in 1921 on the anniversary of Armistice Day. McAulay laid a wreath at the ceremony commemorating 173 city police officers who had died. He became an inspector in 1922 and retired in 1946 after 34 years' service. He died aged 67 at his home in Aitkenhead Road in 1956. His daughter, Isabel, presented his VC to the Scots Guards in 1964.

As we share in this time of remembrance and think of heroes, not just in war, but in peace, in our communities, in our families I think of Bob Dylan's words ... "A hero is someone who understands the responsibility that comes with his freedom."

Iain MacMillan MacAulay

In 1938, Iain joined the medical branch of the RAF. During the Battle of Britain, he was based at Middle Wallop in Hampshire. Iain was sent to Singapore in 1941, arriving just as the city fell. Iain and a few others escaped, stole a lifeboat, and planned to sail to Australia. In Java, they were captured by the Japanese. Iain was imprisoned for three years, first in Java and then in Sumatra, where he suffered appalling conditions as well as being severely tortured. On release in 1945, he weighed just 57 pounds and was so ill with infections that he was expected to lose his sight and not live beyond the age of 50. Luckily, he survived and thrived. Iain later led expeditions into the Scottish mountains to teach young servicemen survival skills, for which he was made an MBE. He retired from the RAF in 1966 with the rank of squadron leader.

In Flanders Fields

In Flanders fields the poppies blow Between the crosses, row on row, That mark our place: and in the sky The larks still bravely singing fly Scarce heard amid the guns below.

We are the dead: Short days ago, We lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow, Loved and were loved: and now we lie In Flanders fields!

Take up our quarrel with the foe To you, from failing hands, we throw The torch: be yours to hold it high If ye break faith with us who die, We shall not sleep, though poppies grow in Flanders fields.

Composed at the battlefront on 3 May 1915 during the Second Battle of Ypres, Belgium.

In Flanders Fields

One of history's most famous wartime poems, "In Flanders Fields" was written during the First World War by Canadian officer and surgeon John McCrae. It helped popularize the red poppy as a symbol of Remembrance.

Ypres

When he volunteered at age 41 for service in the First World War, McCrae wrote to a friend that "I am really rather afraid, but more afraid to stay at home with my conscience." In April 1915, McCrae and a young friend, Alexis Helmer, joined the 18,000 soldiers of the First Canadian Division in their positions near Ypres, Belgium. The Second Battle of Ypres commenced on 22 April and lasted for six hellish weeks. It was during this battle that the Germans launched the first large-scale poison gas attacks of the war.

A Montréal physician, McCrae served as a major and a surgeon with the Canadian Field Artillery, in the Canadian Expeditionary Force. Ypres was the Force's first major engagement of the war.

On 2 May, Alexis Helmer was killed. Because the brigade chaplain was absent, McCrae — as the brigade doctor — conducted the burial service for his friend. Later, at Helmer's grave, he wrote a few lines of verse that were the beginning of the poem "In Flanders Fields."

Poem Published

A journalist who visited the field hospital where McCrae was serving at the front, took a copy back to Punch magazine. Punch printed it on 8 December 1915. It quickly became the most popular poem of the war. Its powerful use of the symbol of the poppies blooming from the churned earth led to the tradition, to this day, of the poppy as a symbol of remembrance for those killed in service. By 1917, "In Flanders Fields" was known throughout the English-speaking world.

Legacy

Today, McCrae's poem is read by millions in Canada and around the world each Remembrance Day. A history museum in the ancient Cloth Hall in Ypres (now leper), Belgium, is named after the poem. The special exhibition gallery in the <u>Canadian War Museum</u> is also named for McCrae.

On January 28, 1918 after an illness of five days, John McCrae died of pneumonia and meningitis. The day he fell ill, he learned he had been appointed consulting physician to the First British Army, the first Canadian so honoured.
